

After the workshops are completed the Directors are invited to submit their Wish Lists, and it is hoped that P.A.G. will be able to process the gathered information and announce the casting for the second half within a few weeks after this.

Update on FOH procedures





There will be a new system for disabled parking in an attempt to simplify arrangements. Patrons requesting a space at the time of booking will be allocated a bay numbered 1 2 3 or 4. They will be sent a ticket with this number on and asked to display this in their wind-screen alongside the blue badge. We will still keep a record in the usual folder for double checking. Duty managers are advised to keep a check on the parking, particularly with visiting acts where the audience is not as familiar with our arrangements. There should always be a 'spare' steward on these nights as there will be no programmes for sale.



Please close - not lock - the entrance doors after the audience has left to prevent the public from wandering into the theatre at the end of the evening.

There's no need to collect the ticket stubs any more. Just meet and greet, help audience members to locate their seats and use the clickers which should be in the Front of House manager's pigeon hole. Fill in your total on the record sheet as usual.



FOH money record slips can be found in the set of small filing drawers near the box office microphone. We have had a little tidy up of the office!



Remember that double points will be issued to front of house and box office staff for outside pro shows (exc KODS/Carpet etc). We realise that many of these nights are at the weekend, usually very busy with unfamiliar customers and often it is difficult to fill the slots. We are trialling this for a season and welcome your comments.

Office/Communications improvement points



On the notice board in the front office will be found a Day by day Calendar Grid of all the rooms in the theatre and their usage for rehearsals, meetings, play readings etc. If you are planning anything, please make sure that the details are on the planner either by writing it



yourself, once it has been confirmed, or by asking the office to do so. It's also a good idea to check with the planner before fixing any date as you never know what it might be clashing with! It also helps to keep the office guys in the loop about activities.



We have re-instated a Communications book (Big A4 diary) located underneath the Calendar Grid. This is used by Gary, Natalie and Josh to leave memos for each other but can also be used by members to leave messages eg front of house things- box office issues re tickets, customer comments/requests; can more j cloths be bought, ladies loo not flushing etc, - we're trying to get away from bits of paper and post it notes.

Joan Wakeman at Comberton School




Comberton School has been performing its end of year show at the Rose for 15 years. They choose a theme and book specialists to work in school to prepare the children and are always impressed at the full participation of the kids who all join in with gusto. Sometimes we have had children on stage dancing with crutches and broken arms! No-one ever wants to miss out. Themes over the years have included The Willow Pattern, Australia, Shakespeare and even Elvis. The staff frequently end up on stage in the final part of the show. All Key stage 2 classes take part. Each class will do 3 items- dances and songs. The Year 6 children are fully involved, working out budgets and making props and costumes. The theatre prints the tickets but school runs its own box office. The older children sell tickets to parents, mark up a seating plan and design and make their own programmes.

The link between the Rose and Comberton has been useful to both. It helped the school to achieve an Artsmark gold and Hugh Meredith referred to it during a grant application. We have society members who first came as Comberton performers. The Comberton dinner ladies enjoy our plays!

I carried on helping with the shows even after retiring 6 years ago and Dave always does their lights and sound. Chris Kay has also been involved the last few years since he's been a teaching assistant there.

This year saw a new school venturing onto the stage at the Rose when Bewdley Primary School year 6 performed their end of school show The Wizard of Oz on July 8th. Huge thanks to Hilary Thompson, Andrew Davie and Alan Booth who assisted on the day as Stage Manager, Lighting and Backstage. Of course, these things don't just happen and those three members plus Gary, Natalie, Ian Williams (a school governor who in his spare time is a TV extra in Poldark!) and I were able to help give the staff and children a pre-show day at the theatre looking at backstage, the lighting box, wardrobe etc. Andrew and I also went into the school to discuss plans with the very keen and knowledgeable 11 year olds - hopefully theatre-goers of the future and possibly Nonnies members via KRYPT - you never know!

The evening was a great success with parents full of praise for the theatre and staff here. Considering the children had only the morning to rehearse the show on our stage for the first time, they did remarkably well to put together a top class show by 6.30. It was a lot of hard work to co-ordinate but it was all worth it on the night. It's difficult to know if nights and events like this can be repeated because of course there are knock-on effects to other shows in the theatre. We had hardly cleared the decks from the KODYS show - another regular group of young people to grace our stage- before Bewdley were here and then our own KRYPT were ready to stage their show the following week!



Theatrical Disaste





Some real theatrical disasters from my various drama groups:

The 'baddie' in Carousel got arrested for embezzlement on the day of the dress rehearsal and the director had to take the part!

The stage crew took against a cast member in White Horse Inn and filled the trunk he had to carry with stage weights. (He couldn't even lift it off the floor and had to drag it off!) How the crew laughed!

Dressed in a skimpy costume (it's OK I was only 21 and a whole lot slimmer !!!) in Kismet, I lost a new (and expensive) contact lens down my bejewelled bra top and began looking and feeling for it along with 'help' from other cast members. The audience became mesmerised, forgot the play and cheered when I found it..... The Director did not!



A member of the lighting crew, whilst crawling through the roof space to alter a light, missed his footing on the wooden spars and legs appeared over the audience heads and pieces of plaster rained down upon them. I, on stage, recognised my brother's leg but soldiered bravely on! I will only say the theatre is a dangerous but interesting place!

The job was made so much easier by the preparatory work done beforehand by Gary and Nat, who set up all the trestle tables, franked the envelopes and printed off the labels. Thank you, Hilary!





Heritage Opportunities Group by Keith Rowland

As I'm composing this short note for the newsletter, I'm reminded of this time last year as we prepared to perform our very successful street theatre re-enactment of Mrs Pankhurst's speech at Kidderminster Town Hall! It was preceded by a collaborative series of workshops which had introduced new members to the Nonentities and provided an enjoyable shared project to which individual members contributed.



This year's Heritage Day event in the Town Hall will be taking place at the same time as the theatre's Open Day, but no doubt will be a lot quieter! Duncan and I, as representatives of the Rose Theatre, will be on duty throughout the event, distributing brochures and manning display boards! The HOG group meets monthly and looks out for the opportunity to promote and celebrate local historic events through interpretation. A series of information panels with maps and photos will be installed in Kidderminster streets during the autumn. The lives of famous and important local people, such as Josiah Mason, manufacturer of writing pens in Birmingham, who was born in Kidderminster, will be celebrated. Accordingly in Mill Street a blue plague is to be installed in his honour.

Since other mainly voluntary local organisations attend the HOG meetings, it is an opportunity to network and keep in touch with wider cultural projects and events. One such example, recently undertaken by the Severn Valley Railway, is a very large lottery project which involves restoration works to the Falling Sands viaduct which takes the railway out over the River Stour & canal into the valley, from Kidderminster Station en route to Bewdley. The project has lots of community outreach opportunities being built into it, including the commissioning of theatrical interpretations and potential opportunities for collaborative projects within the local area over the next couple of years, so watch this space!
