Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year





Well what an eventful few months it has been. Twelve months ago, who would have thought we would be here? But we are. I know we all appreciate it is for the greater good of society, but it is nonetheless highly frustrating.

Your committee and I continue to work hard to ensure the long-term financial security of the society and, whilst we are in no imminent danger, the current situation cannot continue indefinitely. Even upon re-launch it is likely to be a very different world for some considerable time. When non-professional theatres were permitted to re-open, we took a decision to try to perform, but the second lockdown came on the very day we were due to start the short season of monologues. It made me immensely proud to see the level of commitment from the membership in trying to get these shows off the ground, with about half of the membership involved in one way or another.

As I write it is still unclear when we can reopen, as the Department of Arts & Culture is yet to update its guidance. However, we have been advised by the Little Theatre Guild that, in line with Government's guidance, we should recommend our members to refrain from travelling in from Tier 3 locations until such time as we have better information about whether we, as a 'charity that runs as a business', can continue to operate normally. I hope this will come sooner rather than later.

2021 is unlikely to be easy for us as we will be restricted in the range of shows we can perform. As the auditorium was configured for the monologue season, we cannot make any outside lets profitable without charging somewhere in the region £30 per ticket, so it is unlikely that any will take place until we can use a full auditorium. Our own shows will remain restricted to a maximum of 80 seats, but with social distancing, this is more likely to be around 60. Our own shows will need to be restricted to small casts until restrictions are relaxed. It isn't all doom and gloom though – we will be performing again soon. I am also aware that just as some of you are living in tier 3, 40% of the tickets for the monologues were sold to people living in tier 3 locations, so we do have to question the viability of an early rescheduling and if we cannot put the monologues on the stage, we will try to find a way to film the actors and stream them and we will start rehearsals for other shows later in the year.

Here's hoping 2021 is the beginning of a bright future and I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.


Quite unexpectedly we met again when she joined The Rose, and over last few years it has been a delight to spend time with her and Bill both socially and theatrically.


To Bill and the girls we say thank you for sharing Judy with us. A bright and shining light is dimmed for ever. I will never forget Judy.




Our second play was the Shakespeare, 'Much Ado about Nothing'. Lots of parts for everyone, and I was pleased to be able to cast a diverse group of people. Welcome to new members John, Matthew, Emma, Jess and Jane, and it was lovely to see Dink again. Did you know she was 90 this year? I couldn't believe it! This again was a play, the choice of which one or two people expressed concerns, thinking it would not sell.... but it did, and very well! A lot of hard work went into creating it, and our

actors embraced the fun and seemed to romp through the whole thing. Thank you to Keith, Mike and the other hard workers backstage who made it so lovely to look at. The audiences thoroughly enjoyed it too.

Whilst all this was happening, Pam and her team were working hard on the studio production of 'Heroes', but before it could go on, tragedy struck, and we were plunged into lockdown! Rehearsals for other plays had to be postponed, the theatre was shut down, and we were all devastated, not knowing what was going to happen.

Over the months that followed we were constantly trying to find out what we could and couldn't do, as Government directives were very vague. As the professional theatres slowly began to be recognised as viable, we liaised closely with the Little Theatre Guild, of which we are a member, to try to obtain parity with the professionals, as we own our own theatres and are self-funding for the most part. Eventually the various social distancing legislations came into force, and we did risk assessments and put all sorts of precautions in place to make it possible for our lovely theatre to reopen. We chose a series of short, one-person plays, varying the content and splitting them into groups of three, deciding to perform a group per week over the month of November. Our actors came flocking back, and it was with a lot of excitement that we prepared to reopen, albeit with reduced seating and special rules in place. We have to say 'thank you' to Bob, his team and the Trustees, who worked so hard to keep us going. It was tough and very difficult, but The Rose was alive again!

We had already grappled with the logistics of re-licencing our productions and reimbursing audience members, and now we were in the same position. However, I am pleased to inform you all that the monologue plays WILL go on. We are just having to rearrange the groups a little to make sure everyone can be present, but we are hoping to complete what we started!

And what after that you may ask? Well, we still have the licences to do 'Heroes', 'And Then There Were None', and 'Cranford', and although they will all have to be in the main house to make sure distancing is in place, we still intend to perform them in 2021. Final dates are being arranged at the moment, so look out for the e-mails, and keep safe everyone!


